

# KEYNOTE SPEAKER "True Negative Psychology"

To read the psychological literature in recent decades is to come away with the impression that people are irrepressibly confident in their opinions, optimistic about their prospects, and self-assured about their ability to handle life's challenges. To the extent that less sanguine self-assessments are acknowledged, they are explained by "deep" processes like aberrant brain chemistry or unusually damaging past experience. But the people most of us encounter in our daily lives aren't nearly as self-assured as the recent literature suggests—they are plagued by self-doubt, worry frequently about the future, and fear that others are doing much better than they are. In this talk I will explore the origins of this sort of "true negative psychology" in a set of "shallow" psychological processes that influence the assessments of nearly all people, not just the few.
